GUIDELINES FOR PREPARATION OF FINAL REPORTS IN RESPECT OF RESEARCH CARRIED OUT UNDER UNIVERSITY RESEARCH GRANTS

Final reports should be forwarded through the Head of the Department and Dean of the Faculty to the Assistant Registrar, Research and Publications. Three copies should be submitted.

The final report should be comprehensive in nature and should cover the entire period of the research project.

Final report should contain the following information.

References in the text should be cited as the author's name followed by the year of publication in brackets. E.g. Gunawardena & Fernando (1995) or where appropriate, Gunawardena & Fernando, 1995). Use three or more authors as first author et al. (year) and references still in press as (Author, in press). Under the Section 7 of the report, references should be listed alphabetically. Titles of journals should be given in full.
